Folk Legends Lead The Way At 25th Milwaukee Irish Fest

**Line-up celebrates world, pop and rock greats
and the bands that influenced them**

Milwaukee Irish Fest celebrates its 25th anniversary, August 18-21, by convening the most popular Irish folk acts in music history, including Barley Bree, the Black Brothers, Liam Clancy, Evans & Doherty, Tommy Makem, Schooner Fare and Paddy Reilly.

“This year, we pay tribute to some of the greatest folk artists in Irish music by bringing them to the festival play alongside contemporary and emerging acts they influenced,” says Chuck Ward, Irish Fest entertainment coordinator.

One of the most hotly anticipated festival acts is the reunion of Barley Bree band mates P.V. O'Donnell, Jim Sweeney, Tom Sweeney and Steven Wainright who have not performed together at Irish Fest since 1993. Barley Bree is known for hearty up tempo jigs and reels and moving ballads featuring fiddle, banjo and guitars.

Among more than 100 groups spread across 16 lakefront stages will be:

Liam Clancy, one of the most successful folk artists of the 1960s, launched into stardom after performing on the Ed Sullivan Show. His varied career has included touring and performing with The Clancy Brothers & Tommy Makem and as a solo artist.

The Green Fields of America, formed in 1978 by Mick Moloney, the first group on either side of the Atlantic to bring together Irish vocal, instrumental, and dance traditions on the concert and festival stage. Among those who got their start performing with The Green Fields are Seamus Egan, Eileen Ivers, Donny Golden, Jean Butler and Michael Flatley.

Tommy Makem, regarded around the world as “The Godfather” of Irish music, having entertained legions of fans for four decades, armed with his banjo, tinwhistle, poetry, stagecraft and magnificent baritone voice.

Paddy Reilly, one of the most popular balladeers in Ireland, both as a member of the Dubliners and as a solo act.

Irish Fest debuts include Hothouse Flowers, the Bridies and Young Dubliners.

“We are as excited about celebrating new legends as we are in bringing back our best-known bands from years past. Irish Fest has always been about breaking new ground artistically, and this year’s line-up is no exception,” says Ed Ward, Irish Fest president

Featuring former Lord of the Dance fiddlers Brenda Curtin and Máire Egan, the Bridies are one of Ireland’s most popular traditionally influenced contemporary bands. The Hothouse Flowers, a well-known pop group in Ireland since the 1980s, incorporate folk, gospel and traditional music into their original “rock and soul” sound. The Young Dubliners, known for whirling “jig pits” at their shows, combine vocals, guitar, bass, mandolin, harmonica, violin and drums for a rocking jam band sound.

Irish Fest’s 2005 line-up also celebrates the contribution of influential women artists with decades-long international followings. Joining the Bridies as well-known women bands are Carmel Quinn, the only artist in history to perform at Carnegie Hall for 25 consecutive years; Cherish the Ladies, the first commercially successful all-women traditional Irish band; and fiddle legend, Liz Carroll.

Traditional fans can look forward to the Irish Fest return of up-and-comers, Danú, who blend accordion, fiddle, guitar, uilleann pipes, whistles, bouzouki and bodhran, and include Donal Clancy, the son of Liam Clancy.

Irish Fest executive director Jane Anderson says the festival is more than just a folk fest. “It’s an eclectic concert of more than 200 performances ranging from debuts to legends for one low \$12 ticket,” she says. “Scouts, record labels and festival

organizers come to Irish Fest to see the next big thing. We pride ourselves on being on the cutting edge of emerging Irish talent.”

Irish Fest has operated a thriving Rock Stage for 16 years as the popularity of contemporary Irish music has exploded in mainstream American culture. Beyond folk music, a typical line-up mixes bluegrass, jazz, African, Latin, Cuban, and techno influences with more traditional Irish, Celtic and rock sounds.

One of the Fest’s most popular acts is Gaelic Storm, whose up-tempo, high energy Celtic music landed them a role as the “Steerage Band” in the Titanic movie. After seven years, Gaelic Storm continues to be one of Milwaukee Irish Fest’s top entertainment draw, generating more revenue in CD and merchandise than any other band that performs at the festival. Another huge draw is Leahy, a Celtic-pop group hailing from Lakefield, Ontario comprised of the nine Leahy siblings, whose lively performances combine Celtic traditions with Canadian folk and French-Canadian step-dancing.

The hotly anticipated acts on the Celtic Rock Stage will be Seven Nations, a world beat favorite that combines mandolin, violin and bagpipes, for a seascape of Celtic and American rock; and the Young Dubliners, whose legendary live shows have helped to build a fervent fan base comparable to that of “jam band” rockers like Phish and Dave Matthews Band. The younger bands will be joined by veteran political rockers Black 47, whose songs cover topics ranging from the Northern Ireland conflict to civil rights and urban unrest in contemporary New York.

Milwaukee Irish Fest is the world’s largest celebration of Irish music and culture, showcasing more than 100 entertainers annually at the 4-day, 16-stage event at Henry Maier Festival Park on Lake Michigan. Passionately committed to igniting a love of Irish culture in all people, Milwaukee Irish Fest teaches Ireland’s music, dance, drama, sports, culture, children’s activities and genealogy at the festival and through yearlong programming.

President Of Ireland Accepts Invitation To Irish Fest

Visit will celebrate festival's 25th anniversary

The president of Ireland, Mary McAleese, will visit Milwaukee Irish Fest to help celebrate the festival's 25th anniversary.

“We are tremendously honored that President McAleese will travel to the United States with the express purpose of visiting the festival,” said Ed Ward, Irish Fest President.

“This is a testament to Milwaukee Irish Fest's value as a partner preserving Irish pride, culture, language and heritage for the generations,” said Jane Anderson, Irish Fest Executive Director.

Always the third weekend in August, Milwaukee Irish Fest, 2005, will take place from August 18-21.

McAleese, a former barrister and law professor, was inaugurated as the eighth President of Ireland in November, 1997. She is the first President from Northern Ireland, and has a longstanding interest in issues of justice, equality, social inclusion, anti-sectarianism and reconciliation. The theme of her presidency is “building bridges.”

The Irish government is a crucial partner in programming and funding for the Fest. In 2004, the Irish government sponsored the participation of more than a dozen lecturers, artisans, and crafts-people in the festival.

“In the past quarter century, hundreds of thousands of visitors to Milwaukee Irish Fest have learned to appreciate their heritage by participating in the rainbow of arts, cultural, educational and recreational activities at Irish Fest. We are a great resource for building tourism to the Emerald Isle,” Anderson said.



Galway Film Fleadh Awards Announced

The 17th annual Galway Film Fleadh culminated with the Fleadh Awards Ceremony presenting accolades in seven different categories.

The award for Best Irish Short was won by Billy McCannon for 'Recoil'. Brian O'Neill and Paul Bushe picked up the Best First Irish Short for 'A Taxing Night'. 'Pavee Lackeen' won the award for Best First Feature for Perry Ogden. The John Mallon directed 'Idir Dhá Shaol' claimed the award for Best Irish Short Documentary. The Best First Irish Short Animation award went to 'What Have The Brits Ever Done For Us?', directed by Aidan O'Donovan, Colm Tobin and Kevin Nolan. Director Eoghan Kidney picked up the Best Irish Short Animation award for 'Stars' and the Best Feature Documentary category was won by the Mystelle Brabbée directed 'Highway Courtesans'.

The Galway Film Fleadh also introduced a new award this year, the Stella Artois Pitching Award, inviting screenwriters to submit a one-page story idea for screen. Keith Brogue from Limerick was the recipient of the inaugural award.

The winners of each category were presented with a cheque for €1,000, at the ceremony in the Townhall Theatre in Galway July 10.

Anthony Byrne's first feature 'Short Order', starring John Hurt, closed this year's festival.

More People Regularly In Debt - Survey

A new survey by the ESRI and IIB Bank reveals a significant increase in the number of Irish adults regularly in debt and a rise in the amount of money they borrow. The survey suggests the acceleration in non-mortgage borrowings may indicate that consumers' incomes are not rising as quickly as people had expected.

It reveals that one in three people are regularly in debt, with personal loans other than mortgages. One in five said these

loans were imposing a strain on their household finances which suggests that up to 150,000 adults are experiencing significant financial strains. Consumers surveyed said that 60% of non-mortgage debt is used to finance their current lifestyles rather than to fund investment. People earning less than €25,000 a year expressed particular concerns as did those in the 40 to 49 year age bracket. The survey also found one in five mortgage holders have been encouraged to increase borrowings because of the rise in property values. Half of these loans are used for extensions and repairs.

IIB Bank's chief economist Austin Hughes says that the sharp rise in non-mortgage borrowing likely reflects weaker than expected income growth of late as well as the cheap cost of money.

'The fact that the rise in personal debt is due to broadly similar increases in the number of people borrowing and in average loan size is less threatening to the economic outlook than a more concentrated rise in borrowing,' the economist said. However, he noted that while more people are comfortable with their borrowings, a small and increasing number of people are under pressure because of a buildup of debt.

David Duffy of the ESRI, who analysed mortgage borrowing in the survey, says it indicates that consumer's perceptions of the burden of their mortgage debt have remained broadly unchanged over the past year. 'The results suggest that consumers are less concerned about their mortgage debt than their other borrowings,' he adds. He says that those who have purchased property since the beginning of the recent house price boom in 1996 are more likely to indicate that they find their mortgage repayments to be a heavy burden.

Economy Facing Pensions Challenge

The threat posed by a lack of adequate private sector pension provision and increased competition in export markets will be among the major challenges facing the Irish economy in the medium term. This is according to the latest Quarterly Economic Outlook from Friends First, published July 11.

Friends First's economist Jim Power says the Government must focus on developing a proper migration policy and develop a strategy to counteract the threat to Ireland's status as a major recipient of Foreign Direct Investment. Mr. Power says that pension covers remains a crucial issue for the future well being of the economy here. He says that coverage is too low and with the population set to age significantly over the coming decades, he warns that it is imperative that pension

provision is increased to avoid the new species of 'the retiring poor'. 'Pension coverage will have to move up the political agenda as a matter of extreme urgency,' the economist urges.
