I found a great website full of quizzes on all things Ireland, written by various contributors. It is a great way to discover that as much as you think you know about the island, there is so much more you can find out.

This particular quiz is a tour of Ireland by song. “After a night in Dublin, which thankfully coincided with the ‘All Ireland Football Final’ the premier tournament in Gaelic sport, I meet a group of people singing ‘One Fair County’ the county they are singing about, is known as the Orchard County, which Irish county is it? It is the centenary of the action of James Joyce’s “Ulysses”, which took place June 16, 1904, although published in 1922. A search yielded this nugget: “Tattarrattat is the longest palindrome (a word or group of words that is the same

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whether you read it forwards from the beginning or backwards from the end) in the Oxford English Dictionary, which calls it a nonce word. One of my favorite places to go to find out about the Irish in the world is the Wild Geese site. The expatriate Irish who served in the armies of the houses of Europe have become legend, and were a force in world change. This day, I revisited the “Wine Irish”, the vintners of France who came over to serve the King of France and stayed to serve the restaurants of the world, one glass at a time. <http://www.thewildgeese.com>.

Another search of Irish Wild Geese came up with, “Of some 380 species of wild birds recorded in Ireland, 135 breed in the country. There is considerable migration of birds to Ireland in spring and autumn, while several species arrive from Greenland and Iceland in winter; 75 per cent of the world’s population of the Greenland white fronted goose winter in Ireland.” Imagine, real wild geese. Further research found that Scotland claims that fifty percent of the flock winters on the Scottish island of Islay. With the close proximity, one can imagine that some decide to wing over to Alba for a short holiday.

But wait; there are more wild geese in Ireland. And there are pictures of these birds. The Bean Geese are about the size of mallards, dwarves compared to their North American cousins, the Canada geese, who went from the brink of extinction to park pest. The website, <http://www.irishbirding.com> has photos and more on the birds of Ireland. As for the Bean Geese, here is a review by Killian Mullarney that was posted on the site:

“During the winters of 2002-03 and 2003-04 a number of Bean Geese (*Anser fabalis*) were found in Ireland where the species is rare. Due to the difficulties in separating the two main recognized subspecies Taiga (*A. f. fabalis*) and Tundra (*A. f. serrirostris*), and lack of observer familiarity with either, some of these birds were initially identified as belonging to one sub-species and then subsequently re-identified as the other. All the birds were seen in the company of either Greylag Geese and Greenland White-fronted Geese for comparison and they remained at their chosen sites long enough for birders to watch them at length and gain valuable experience.

“This bird was found at Portmore Lough near Lough Neagh, Co. Antrim in late January 2003. It was initially identified as a Tundra goose until photographs were published and the identification was resolved. The really crucial feature when trying to decide if a bird is a Taiga or a Tundra Bean Goose is the shape of the bill. Generally speaking, the bill of Taiga Bean is rather long, slender toward the tip, often with a slightly concave culmen. The bill of Tundra Bean is generally shorter, blunter, and comparatively deeper at the base, and may contribute to an impression of the bill being ‘stuck-on’ the face.”

The writer’s block is still there. However, I did find out about Irish palindromes, Franco-Irish vintners, and geese with stuck on bills. A veritable treasure trove of knowledge, all at the tips of one’s fingers. Now if I only knew the answer to the quiz.
