Milwaukee's emerald festival will shine this year with a focus on County Clare, Ireland's Banner County, its Women in Celtic Music Showcase and a once-in-a-lifetime visit from Ireland's own Archbishop Sean Brady. In its 27th year and still leaving crowds awestruck, Irish Fest, August 16-19, promises to be a truly magical event.

Special to the festival this year is the Cultural Village's feature on County Clare. The Village will showcase the region's strong culture through exhibits that will include: Follow the High King's Footsteps – an exhibition of Brian Boru, the last great high king of Ireland, who hails from County Clare; Circling the Heritage of County Clare – an exhibit of how emigration has affected the County; The Eagles Egg – an exhibition that discusses the Great Irish Famine.

Visitors who love St. Patrick's Day are in for a treat. New to the cultural area this year is a display on The Saint Patrick Centre which comes to Irish Fest straight from Down Patrick, Northern Ireland. Dr. Tim Campbell will bring an exciting series of interactive displays which tell the story of St. Patrick, Ireland's patron saint. Guests are encouraged to learn about St. Patrick's legacy and the impact of Ireland's missionaries while experiencing artwork and metalwork produced during this golden age.

Families that are looking for something new at the festival this year are encouraged to take a day-trip to Ireland through the Family Passport to Irish Fest. Pirate Paddy and the Family Passport will take kids on a journey through the grounds and give parents a fun way to entertain the entire family, navigate the grounds with ease and enjoy an authentic Irish experience along the way. Kids can lead their parents to destinations listed on the passport and collect colorful stamps at different areas at the fest including Greenwish Village, the Cultural Village and Celtic Canines along the Lakewalk. To begin their journey, families can pick up the Family Passport on Saturday and Sunday from Noon to 4 p.m. in the Children's Area.

Wisconsin Calendar of Events including Project Kells. Project Kells is a game developed by Murray Heasman of Tailten Games, Clonakilty Cork. The game, inspired by the Book of Kells, will be played tournament-style, in the Cultural Exhibits Tent during the festival. Volunteers will be on hand to teach participants the game's strategy and its relation to the intricate drawings of the original Book of Kells.

A host of new entertainers and seasoned favorites will play the Irish Fest stages throughout the weekend. Bands who are new to the festival this year include, The Tossers, a south side Chicago band which mixes its love of traditional folk music with the fury of punk rock; The Larkin and Moran Brothers, a self-titled Celtic rat pack who play a hard-driving mix of traditional and original tunes in the vain of The Clancys, Pogues and Saw Doctors; and the Celtic Tenors, three beautifully trained voices who seamlessly meld Celtic, classical and pop styles.

Returning to the festival to delight audiences again will be popular Celtic rock band Gaelic Storm, celebrating its 10th anniversary. Gaelic Storm is an amalgamation of Irish, English and U.S.-born band members. The band, which is known for producing creative original music steeped in Irish tradition, will be celebrating their 10th Anniversary, appropriately titled: Storm Warning, at Irish Fest this year.

Also returning to the festival are: Scythian from Washington D.C, a traditional Celtic band with elements of folk and gypsy music in their sound; Canadian band, Enter The Haggis, who fuses Celtic rock, bluegrass and funk; and The Fuchsia Band from County Cork, Ireland, who specializes in traditional song, dance and storytelling.

Damien Dempsey, an Irish singer-songwriter popular for performances that encourage audience participation, is new to Irish Fest this year. Dempsey takes his love of traditional Irish music and incorporates the Sean-Nós style with the sounds of his music heroes – Bob Marley and Elvis Presley. These inspirations have given Dempsey's music a distinctive style and the singalongs that are the trademark of his gigs.

A centerpiece of Irish Fest entertainment will be the Celtic Women in Music Showcase. Playing the Celtic Roots Stage throughout the festival will be some of the top female names in Celtic music, including Aoife Clancy, daughter of Bobby Clancy of the iconic Clancy Brothers; fiddle virtuoso Liz Carroll; Eddi Reader, a honey-voiced vocalist from Glasgow; Ladies of Longford, an Ohio mother-daughter trio who render lovely adaptations of traditional folk songs; Liadan, an all-female Irish band that weaves old and new music into a colorful tapestry; and Cathie Ryan, one of the leading voices in Celtic music.

Topping off this celebration of Celtic women will be a performance by the all-female traditional Irish band, Cherish the Ladies. One of the most engaging ensembles in the history of Irish music, the band will play a special Sunday (August 19) reunion show on the Aer Lingus stage where they'll be joined by band alums Aiofe Clancy and Cathie Ryan.

This year, Ireland's famous Belleek Pottery will celebrate its 150th Anniversary with a shop in the Cultural Village and issue special limited-edition pieces, including a Milwaukee Irish Fest ornament that's sure to be a collector's item.

Guests who are looking for more hidden treasures will enjoy an authentic Irish shopping trip to the festival's Grafton Square, Lilliput area and Moore Street Marketplaces. Featured artists in the Moore Street Market hail from County Clare and include Gerry Ruarne who will display handcrafted fused glass jewelry, Susan Minogue will present attractive wall plaques and figurines from resin and stonecast, while Tim Moloney will bring his well-known landscape and seascape paintings.

Irish Fest visitors yearning for spiritual fulfillment are invited to celebrate the Liturgy for Peace and Justice with Ireland's Archbishop Sean Brady on Sunday, August 19, at 9:30 a.m. in the Marcus Amphitheater. Milwaukee's Archbishop, Timothy Dolan, will concelebrate with Archbishop Brady, marking the mass as a very special first for Irish Fest.

But before the festival begins, enthusiasts are encouraged to enroll in the Irish Fest Summer School to learn about Irish music, history and culture. The Irish Fest Summer School will focus many of its classes on Clare County, and will host classes taught by entertainers featured in the Celtic Women in Music Showcase. An addition to the traditional Summer School curriculum is a Travel Ireland class that will give individuals tips on the best ways to prepare for and travel in Ireland including passport information, hotel stays, car rentals, weather information and how to take great photography. ## Gain Knowledge, Have Fun At Irish Fest Summer School

Courses Offer a Chance to Learn Irish History, Culture, Music, Crafts and More

Want to learn more about all things Irish? The Milwaukee Irish Fest Summer School August 12-17 has what you need. This year the course offerings cover just about everything – from literature and history to weaving and Irish women – all conveniently located at the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee campus.

These Summer School classes are an important part of the 27th Annual Irish Fest, which will take place August 16-19 at Henry Maier Festival Park on Milwaukee's Lakefront. World-renowned Irish musicians, artists, writers and officials will serve as instructors and bring to life the rich cultural traditions of Ireland for people of all ages. To register, visit irishfest.com or call Barb Breed-Heidt at (262) 227-6538.

"This is a great opportunity for people to expand their knowledge of Ireland and experience the tremendous contributions the Irish have made to our world in a setting that is fun, stimulating and enjoyable," said Jane Walrath, coordinator of the Irish Fest Summer School.

Featured classes this year will include Women in Celtic Music with musician and folklorist Mick Moloney as instructor; an advanced fiddle class with fiddle virtuoso Liz Carroll; and Celtic Women: Myths, Legends & History of Irish Women with instructors Dr. Nancy Walczyk, Dr. Christine Hamlin and Colleen Booker. Courses in tin whistle, piano accordion and sean-nos harmony will be taught by members of the Celtic band Liadan, which will be performing at Irish Fest.

Other Irish-themed courses will include Philip Brennan's class in the landscape and natural life of the Burren and County Clare, and Travel Potpourri, a Friday (August 20) Sampler lecture (from 9-10:30 a.m.) with Muiris O Rócháin, founder and director of the famed Willie Clancy School. Sean Farrell, Ireland's new Consul General, also will give a Friday Sampler talk on Contemporary Ireland. There will be classes in genealogy for beginners and novices, beginning, intermediate and advanced bodhran (the framedrum that forms the heartbeat of Irish music), a beginning Irish language class, a master guitar class, straw weaving, quilting and others.

In past years, Irish Fest Summer School instructors have included renowned musician, Tommy Makem and dancing master, Tony Ryan. Guest lecturers have included Eamon O Cuiv, Ireland's Minister of the Department of Community, Rural & Gaeltacht Affairs, Tommy Graham, editor of History Ireland magazine, and author/actor Malachy McCourt.
