Holiday Folk Fair 2007 – The Compasses of Culture

HELP MAKE THE IRISH REPRESENTATION A SUCCESS!

Maybe people have heard the name of St Brendan the Navigator. What he did was remarkable. Around the year 530, Brendan set sail from the foot of Mount Brandon, Shanakeel — Seana Cill, (Old Church), in County Kerry for a seven year voyage. There, he and between fourteen and sixty others took a journey that was said to have landed in the New World. The records he left were remarkable, and it is said that Christopher Columbus had not only a Galway man, but a copy of Brendan's "Navagatio Sancti Brendani" to help guide him across the ocean, on his voyage in 1492. However, many people regarded the account to be either a religious allegory or a fairy tale.

Brendan, however, was using the records of others. He was following the directions of the monks who came before, and made the same journey in earlier times. The Navagatio told of encountering goats on an island, landing on an island, which turned out to be a whale, volcanoes, and a place where there was a lot of greenery.

In 1976, Tim Severin, an English scholar, built a boat to the dimensions that Brendan had left in his book. He set sail in the boat, made out of leather and wood, using the directions that Brendan set forth. It took two years, but Severin and his crew landed in Newfoundland, Canada. In the process, he documented many of the same things that Brendan listed. He was able to put names to the places that Brendan mentioned. What was considered fabulous was now seen to be factual.

In recent years, a person by the name of Crichton Miller has speculated that the Celtic Cross, the rounded top crucifix, was actually a working wheel that was used in prehistoric times by

actually a working wheel that was used in prehistoric times by Celtic navigators. It certainly does have a marked resemblance.

The theme this year is the "Compasses of Culture." A compass can be a navigational instrument for finding directions. Or it can be an area in which something acts or operates or has power or control. The ancient Celts invaded the British Isles in a number of waves from Continental Europe. Their control extended over the area from the furthest western parts of the continent to Asia Minor. As their power receded, they were somewhat isolated to those northern islands. The Celts were also great seafaring peoples, making trips to the north of Africa and the Mediterranean Sea back to their homelands.

The modern Irish have inhabited all continents except Antarctica in the past number of centuries. In the United States, over one-fifth of all people say they have some Irish ancestry. The same numbers can be counted in Canada. In Australia, where prison ships dropped off thousands of Irish, about one tenth of the Aussies say they have the blood of Erin in them.

For whatever reasons, be it famine, forced deportation for crimes, or just economic needs, the Irish managed to both navigate to foreign lands, and then take control of them. The Irish ran the Catholic Church in both the U.S. and Australia. Political machines were developed by the sons of St Patrick. In the past few decades, Irish culture, song and dance have become very popular and strong throughout the world. What may have started out as accidents of emigration became sources of strength for the Irish. In this way, the compasses have both helped to direct them, and to let that same culture grow.

It is time for the annual Holiday Folk Fair. This year, it will again be held at the Wisconsin State Fair Grounds, 84th and Greenfield. The dates are November 16, 17, and 18. The Shamrock Club will represent the Irish in our sales, food and cultural booths. The Glencastle Irish Dancers will be the dance representatives.

We are again the face of the Irish community in this area. Each year we are called upon to represent the Irish, to show the world what we are, what we have done, and what we can do. To do that, the Shamrock Club will need volunteers for our retail, cultural, and food areas. We also need to sell tickets to the Folk Fair.

Admission is as follows: Adults \$8 in advance. Tickets will be available for sale at the November membership meeting. Please see Muriel Crowley. You can also use the accompanying order form to purchase tickets via mail. As a sponsoring group of the Fair we need to sell a number of tickets or make up the cost elsewhere.

Officers for the next two year term were elected and they are as follows



Mr. Cola is interested in offering a book discount if any of the clubs are interested in using a book sale as a fund raiser. The board shared fundraising ideas. A couple of new ideas came from LaFayette County. At a Cinco de Mayo event they sold Irish Soda Bread in a jar for \$5.

The ingredients are: 4 cups flour; 2 tsp baking soda; 2 tsp sugar. In a quart jar we find that layering from bottom up mixes well: two cups flour, sugar, baking soda, and the remaining two cups of flour on top. Instructions are included for baking, see graphic below.



Important when baking: (1) don't over mix, as this will make the bread tuff; (2) make a ball of dough and make no thicker than a fist, I flatten mine a bit more, otherwise it is a bit tricky to get it to cook even. (3) cover with a cloth when done and this will give the bread an awesome crust!

They also sold cinnamon rolls with green icing. Mmmm, doesn't that sound good!
