The Story of Seamus MacManus

Many Irish-American homes have a copy of a book entitled, The Story of the Irish Race. It is a readable book, going back to the mythic start of Ireland, and uses historical references and counter-references in its citation. For many, it was the first in-depth introduction to Irish history and life.

The author of the book was Seamus MacManus, an Irish writer, Nationalist, Sinn Fein founder, and Irish speaker, among other things. He said that the reason he wrote the book was that during speaking tours of the United States, many people questioned him as to whether Ireland had a history. He was amazed that so many sons and daughters of Erin had no idea of the rich fabric of the Irish people, woven full of stories and peoples, beauty and horror, for over three thousand years. This was a wrong he decided to right.

MacManus was born in Mountcharles, County Donegal, in 1868, the son of Irish rebels. According to a 2005 story in the Donegal Times, he became a teacher in the local Glencough School, and by 1898, his nationalist activities and teaching of Irish history drew the attention of the Department of Education. He started the Gaelic League in the county and a branch existed in Mountcharles into the 1940s. He was also the organizer of the first County Board meeting of the GAA in 1905, the same year he helped to establish Sinn Fein. It was a busy year for him as he also financed the formation of a Republican flute band in Mountcharles, which existed up until the Treaty.

MacManus' involvement in the growing "Irish Ireland" movement of the early part of the century was typical of the rising patriotism of the period and the intense and dedicated involvement of many prominent nationalists of the times.

He was not the only one active in his family in the causes of Irish rights and language. Seamus' older brother, Patrick, emigrated to North America at fourteen and spent eight years in the United

States navy. Patrick McManus then settled in Argentina, where he attended college at Mar del Plata. After two years, he was appointed to teach mathematics and English literature. After trips back home to Ireland to direct the 100th anniversary of the United Irish in Mountcharles, as well as writing for Irish journals in France, he returned to Argentina to found the first chapter of the Gaelic League outside of Ireland, in Buenos Aires. He was an active member of the Irish Republican League in Argentina, (Argentina was home to a large Irish community), and constantly wrote articles advising the Argentinean government to seize the Falkland Islands from Britain.

In 1897, MacManus first met Belfast poet Anna Johnston, better known as Ethna Carberry. Under her pen name, she is best known for the rewriting of the song, "Roddy McCorley", regarding the Presbyterian United Irish leader who was executed in her hometown of Ballymena. Carberry was also the editor of the magazine Shan Van Vocht, which brought her into contact with leaders of the Gaelic League, including Douglas Hyde and MacManus. That trip to her mother's Donegal home led to love and marriage in 1901. Sadly, Carberry died the following year in Revlin House, near Donegal Town, and was buried in Frosses. MacManus was devastated, and was unable to complete her biography for almost a decade.

In 1911, MacManus married Catalina Violante Paex, a granddaughter of a former President of Venezuela. The couple had two daughters, both of whom are still living in America. He was a prolific writer and in 1917 he wrote Ireland's Case, dedicating it to the Fenian John Devoy. His Story of the Irish Race was published in 1938, and is still in print. He also wrote many novels, poems and books on Irish folklore. He was well known in the U.S. and lectured extensively in colleges and universities all over the States.

MacManus was an unbending nationalist. In the 1950s, he was to be the main speaker at the unveiling of a memorial to the men who had killed Lord Leitrim in Fanad in 1878. When he learned that a Member of Parliament, Eddie McAteer, would share the stage with him, he refused to appear, because McAteer had taken the oath of loyalty to the British Monarch.

MacManus was active until he fell in New York City at the age of 92, where he died a few weeks later. When his remains were brought to Donegal in the summer of 1961, he was given a Sinn Fein funeral, which was attended by people from all over Ireland. A Sinn Fein Guard of Honour met the hearse at the foot of the Glen of Mountcharles, and his friend, Eamonn Monaghan, placed the tricolor on the coffin.

The funeral procession moved slowly through Mountcharles, which was thronged with mourners, before stopping at the Corner Pump. This was the spot from which MacManus entertained the children and people with his folk tales. Sinn Fein member Sean Ohlgline of Glencolmcille recited the Rosary in Irish at the Pump. The cortege

continued on to the graveyard in Frosses where he was interred in the MacManus plot.

Seamus MacManus, the Donegal schoolteacher, created a good deal of his own modern Irish history. His foresight to bringing the history of Ireland to its expatriates and their children may very well have been a catalyst for the current interest in Ireland and what it means to be Irish.

We have had to change, and we will always do so, or we will wither and become superfluous to the world. We are not, and we should not go quietly into that night.

The best part of the Shamrock Club is also a point of where we get lost at times. What are we, and who are we? We are an Irish-American organization, and we provide a focal point for the Irish community in Milwaukee and Wisconsin. But that somewhat plastic nature of what we are can be a hindrance. We don't have the definitions of many of the groups we support, such as the hurlers, Irish Fest, and the dance schools. But that allows us, in some ways, to adapt and be able to jump at chances that other groups may not be able to take advantage of.

The best part of the Shamrock Club is its membership. It is a magnificent group of people, diverse and interesting, and always

ready to work, or do what is needed when asked. Thank you.

Over the years, I have tried to keep the focus on being an Irish group. We have something unique to offer the world. Our monthly meetings have been a great place for people to hear Irish music, learn about subjects they may not have, and just generally enjoy being Irish-American, or the part about hanging around with the Irish that makes people happy.

Our annual installation dinner will be at Alioto's Restaurant on Burleigh and Mayfair Roads on Thursday, July 10. It will be a buffet. Shamrock Club member Dennis Moroney will swear in the new board.
