2011 Irish Fest to Celebrate Ireland Counties of Derry and Donegal

In Addition to Festival Favorites, Special Showcase Will Be Dedicated to Area's Contributions from Music to Irish Coffee

Milwaukee Irish Fest – North America's largest, four-day celebration of Irish music and culture on the beautiful shores of Lake Michigan, celebrates its 31st anniversary this summer, August 18 through 21, with a special showcase featuring the Ireland counties of Derry and Donegal.

New this Year: Derry and Donegal Showcase

There are certain parts of neighboring Ireland counties, Derry and Donegal that are instantly recognizable. Things like historic walls, bridges, and sculptures that tell the story of reconciliation. There are landscapes of dramatic cliffs, sandy beaches, and unspoiled bog lands that enchant visitors and native music, like the distinctive traditional fiddle of the region. Not to mention, the home of the original Irish coffee. The counties of Derry and Donegal will be featured at this year's Irish Fest through a special "Derry and Donegal Showcase." Spread throughout the festival grounds, the showcase will highlight the culture, heritage, and music that have helped shape the deeply rooted history of these two counties.

The vibrant city of Derry is one of the oldest inhabited sites in Ireland and boasts 6,000 years of creativity. One of the founding fathers of this must-see city was St. Columcille, a poet, priest and emigrant. 2013 marks the 400th anniversary of the building of the city's monumental walls, another important chapter that shaped the history of this place. A melting pot for history, heritage, activity and adventure, Donegal is a region studded with thriving little towns, cozy pubs, excellent seafood, and a friendly welcome. In addition to being known for their exquisite textiles, Donegal is famous for their rich fiddle tradition. Together, Derry and Donegal was the key emigrant port out of Ireland in the 18th and 19th centuries.

Hundreds of thousands of emigrants left from these shores, giving the Northwest a unique Diaspora of over 9 million. It's no surprise, then, that the area is known as the "Atlantic Gateways."

Festival goers are invited to explore the Derry and Donegal region as it exists today through interactive exhibits spread throughout the expansive 75-acre festival grounds. These two special counties will be represented at several of the must-see venues at Irish Fest this year, including the Moore Street Market, the Cultural Pavilion, Hedge School, and numerous musical stages, including the Lakefront Brewery Celtic Roots Stage, the main showcase stage for Derry and Donegal artists. In addition, look for these Derry and Donegal attractions on the festival grounds:

- Special exhibit on Beech Hill House and its connection in helping soldiers during WWII in the Cultural Pavilion
- Ceramics, jewelry, and textiles featuring famous area weavers, artists, and craftsmen will be available for purchase in the Moore Street Market
- Exhibit on weaving by Studio Donegal in the Cultural Pavilion
- Discussion on Derry being selected as the UK City of Culture 2013 in the Hedge School
- Award-winning films, "Paradiso," "Shine of Rainbows" and "Dance Lexi Dance," will be shown in the Volta Theatre
- Irish language experts from Glencolumcille and An Culturlann, Genealogist Brian Mitchell and emigration historian Paddy Fitzgerald will be in the Cultural Village
- Stories of U.S. presidential links to Ulster-Scots will unfold in the Hedge School

As part of this year's special focus on the Ireland counties of Derry and Donegal, musicians who hail from those regions and are set to perform at the festival include:

Altan. No Irish traditional band in the last dozen years has had a wider impact on audiences and music lovers than Altan. With their exquisitely produced, award-winning recordings, evident is the band's unwavering commitment to bringing the beauty of traditional Donegal music to contemporary audiences.

Moya Brennan. When you walk the windswept hills and endless beaches of Donegal, the music of Moya Brennan just makes sense. Moya's voice captures the essence of her homeland in all its cascading beauty, mystery, and contradictions. Her music refreshes, heals, and brings a sense of calm to tired hearts.

Kintra. Under the musical direction of renowned fiddle player, Matt McGranahan, Kintra showcases a fusion of Irish and Scottish cultures through, song and dance in an exciting colorful stage show featuring fiddle, piano, tin whistle, guitar, bass, drums, pipers, and

singers.

Different Drums. Different Drums brings the indigenous drums of Ireland – the lambeg and the bodhran together for performances hailed as “celebratory.” The band has played across the world sharing the message – “Celebrate that which makes us different and that which bonds us together.”

Liz Doherty Connection. Dr. Liz Doherty is a well-known fiddle player who hails from Donegal. She performs as the Liz Doherty Connection and, with her PHD in music, lectures on Traditional music at the University of Ulster. Doherty is the director of the North Atlantic Fiddle Convention to be held in Derry and Donegal in 2012.

Fidil. Described as “stunning” and “mind-blowing,” Fidil are rapidly forging a reputation for exhilarating and challenging music. Their music making is marked by an intricate and intelligent approach that maintains the fiery exuberance of traditional fiddle music of their native Donegal.

Brendan Hendry Band. Brendan Hendry, an Irish traditional fiddle player, hails from Bellaghy in South Derry. His work has been called “real trad played and sung perfectly.”

The Henry Girls. The Henry Girls – Joleen, Lorna, and Karen McLaughlin – are three sisters from Inishowen in Co. Donegal, Ireland. The band’s name comes from the local family nickname, Henry. Their music is an eclectic mix of folk, blues, and traditional Irish, with “spine-tingling” three-part harmonies.

Nodlaig Brolly. Nodlaig brings a mix of Gaelic singing accompanied by her champion harp and flute. This singer/songwriter with a beautiful voice and excellent musicianship has played with the *San Diego Philharmonic Orchestra* as a special guest.

Kathleen Fitzgerald with the Screaming Orphans. Kathleen Fitzgerald is regarded as one of the finest vocalists to emerge out of the Céilí band scene, performs with her four daughters who, following in their mother’s footsteps formed a band that stays true to their roots in traditional Irish music with pop and rock strains.

Tom Sweeney. People have been singing ballads since the beginning of time; ballads of the famine, ballads of the Irish Revolution, going back hundreds and hundreds of years. Tom captures the mood and essence of this traditional music while singing and playing from the heart. He remains an instrumental figure in keeping the Makem tradition alive.

Festival Favorites

Be sure to check out all of the traditional attractions at Irish Fest that have kept fans coming back for the past 31 years. Don’t miss watching talented Irish dancers, shopping for eclectic souvenirs, viewing our children’s freckle contest and tasting the flavors of

Ireland.

The Tossers In Concert Sept. 24 at ICHC

Melding traditional Irish music with punk rock roots. Chicago's *Tossers* will kick off the fall Hallamor Concert Series on Saturday, Sept. 24, at the Irish Cultural and Heritage Center, 2133 W. Wisconsin Ave., Milwaukee, starting at 8:30 p.m.

Hailing from Chicago's South Side, the six-member band is a staple in the Celtic, punk and folk scenes and have performed with and been compared to the *Pogues*, *Dropkick Murphys*, *Black 47* and *Flogging Molly*. Combining traditional instrumentation including fiddle, whistles, button box and mandolin with guitar, bass and drums, the *Tossers* play with a furious edge that teeters between rage and raucousness but also finds room for pensive Irish ballads.

Named irreverently for the derogatory meaning of "throw away," the band has been serious about expanding the boundaries of contemporary Irish music since the early 1990s. In contrast to their fiery live shows, their five albums are dedicated to "elegance and provocation" according to the band. *The Emerald City*, their sixth recording, is scheduled for a 2011 release.

"The *Tossers*? have been labeled as the truest modern folk band in

years?with a wondrous array of early folk roots, yet taking interest with just a small bit of a rock drive. This sound is best left for ears only, instead of words.” – Sputnik Music.

Tickets for the show are \$19 in advance and \$25 on concert day with a \$10 price for students with ID. There are also discounts for groups.
