Michael Sheehan and Franklin Village – St. Martins

In 1834, Michael Sheehan registered a land claim in a section of southwestern Milwaukee County. The Irish immigrant from County Cork was one of the first people to settle in the area. His brother, Patrick, and Patrick's wife, Bridget, built a log cabin on section 17 on Milwaukee Street, later known as St. Martins Road, in 1836. Thus began the settling of Franklin.

The Sheehan log cabin is believed to be the first home built in the township. With the arrival of the Irish came the arrival of the Irish priest, Father Patrick O'Kelley. By 1839, 112 people had purchased farms in the area, so the priest was a busy man on Sundays. On sunny days, Father O'Kelley held services under Garrett Fitzgerald's elm tree, and in bad weather, in the Sheehan cabin.

Father O'Kelley left in 1842, and was succeeded by Father Martin Kundig, a Swiss priest. Under Fr. Kundig's leadership, the residents petitioned Bishop Henni on the formation of a parish. Garrett Fitzgerald and Lewis Kent deeded over portions of their land for the building of a structure, which was known as Holy Assumption Parish. The first church was built in 1848, and lasted until a lightning strike destroyed it in 1866.

In the late 1840s and early 1850s, a number of Germans emigrated to the area, and at first were happy to worship with their Irish neighbors in English, but by 1858, they moved into their own church, the Sacred Hearts of Jesus and Mary, where services were conducted in German.

One of the first schools in the area was the Whelan School, at what is now St. Martins and Puetz Roads, reflecting the Irish nature of the village. A church school was built near Sacred Hearts Church,

and was referred to as the "German schoolhouse." German was taught in the morning, and English classes were taught in the afternoon.

There was a desire for more commerce for the area. The Town of St. Martins was platted by the civil engineering firm of Gregory and Power on March 22, 1850. There was hope that a canal would be built between the Root River and Big Muskego Lake, one that would allow farmers to be able to move their grains to both Milwaukee and Chicago, thus solving the problem of muddy and inconsistent roads that made shipping difficult. Increase Lapham weighed in on the positive aspects of the idea, and Byron Kilbourn bought tracts of land in the area for just such a purpose.

The first lot sold in the village of St. Martins was sold to Margaret Sheehan on May 5, 1850. Other longtime families also purchased township lots. The first post office in the township of Franklin was in St. Martins. In the 1870s, the census listed 292 Irish families, and 260 German families.

However, within a few years, the idea of a bustling center of commerce died out. As a village though, it lasted until 1907.

Many people thought that Fr. Kundig named the village after himself, but one genealogist found that three of the German families came from the village of Lingenfeld, and their church was St. Martins Catholic Church.

As for Holy Assumption and Sacred Hearts of Jesus and Mary, by the 1990s the two were merged into one parish, St. Martin of Tours, and in 1999, Holy Assumption was closed and sold to the New Hope Community Church. Many of the parishioners at Holy Assumption were angered and resentful of the Archdiocese's decision.

As for the Sheehan's log cabin, it has had a longer life. A twostory addition was attached to the cabin during the 1850s and it remained in the family until Dennis Sheehan sold the farm to Michael Godsell in 1911. The Godsell family were Irish-Americans from Clyman, and they moved their farm livestock by foot, driving them across Wisconsin's rural roads, from Central Wisconsin to the southeastern part of the state.

Michael Godsell and his wife raised five children, including a son, Tom, who bought the farm in 1920. Tom Godsell married Mary Wallace in 1921 and they continued to live on the farm with their seven children until 1967.

Tom Godsell would be the last town chairman of the Town of Franklin, as it incorporated as a city in 1956. When the Godsell farmhouse was demolished in 1975, the log cabin was moved to Legend Park, on Loomis Rd. and Drexel Ave., where it is a part of the historical settlement.

Michael Sheehan was looking for a place to farm and live, and



grow a family when he left Cork. He grew a bit more than that, as it turned out.

The band members – each of whom is an award-winning musician – met while students at the Irish World Academy of Music and Dance in Limerick, Ireland. Their eclectic combination of influences and backgrounds "buzz and fizz together," according to the UK's *Maverick Magazine*, resulting in traditional music with a modern twist that is far greater than the sum of its parts.

Lead vocalist and wooden flute player Norah Rendell, a native of Canada, began her career as a professional recorder player and then turned to folk music, which led to a 2008 nomination as Traditional Singer of the Year by the Canadian Folk Music Awards.
