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68th Annual Holiday Folk Fair – November 18-20, 2011 Celebrate Culture Without Borders

In 1921, Ireland was divided. The new autonomous Northern Ireland was formed from six of the nine counties of Ulster, four counties with unionist majorities, and Fermanagh and Tyrone, two of the five Ulster counties which had nationalist majorities.

It was, in large part, divided between the unionists sections of the North, and the mainly nationalist south. Subsequently, on December 6, 1922, the whole island of Ireland became an independent dominion known as the Irish Free State but Northern Ireland immediately exercised its right to opt out of the new dominion.

The North gave up rights to Donegal, but took the sections of the county that held portions of Derry/Londonderry city. The division also caused an increase of violence, especially in Belfast, where both the Irish Republican Army and the Ulster Volunteer Force took up arms against each other.

A subsequent migration took place, wherein families gave up homes that had been theirs for generations. This in turn led to intense gerrymandering, creating compact Catholic and Nationalist enclaves, and lesser populated Unionist but larger area voting sectors. Laws were then enacted that allowed discrimination against Catholics in employment, which also caused more emigration by Catholics from the North.

The border gave rise to smuggling, a continuation of the ancient Irish practice that had long made Ireland the center of piracy in Europe. Customs controls were introduced on the frontier shortly after the establishment of the Irish Free State. However, the porous borders allowed everything to go back and forth, from cigarettes and alcohol, and produce to automobiles.

When the Troubles started in the 1970s, security on the border suddenly was tightened. The British Army was in charge of patrolling, and smugglers who had worked with impunity for decades discovered their livelihoods were impinged. The search for weapons turned up the whole line of consumer goods that traversed the border. The 1986 movie, "Eat the Peach," was about a pair of brothers-in-law who turned daredevils after their smuggling was curtailed.

The Border also was a psychological barrier for the populations of both sides. When there was a downturn in the economy, people in the North in the 1980s looked across the sea for a better, or a newer life, not the South, as there was a sense they would be treated badly by people of the Republic. Citizens of the south also didn't feel that the northern climate was an inviting one for them, after seeing the abridgement of civil rights on an ongoing basis.

Things thawed, eventually. One of the reasons was entry of both the United Kingdom and the Republic into the European Union in 1992. Passports weren't needed to cross over. Then, over the next decade, life changed dramatically. Manufacturing collapsed in the North, putting thousands out of work, while the Republic was in the beginnings of the phenomenon called the Celtic Tiger. The southern economy was importing people from across the world. Northerners discovered the Republic, and the job opportunities it afforded.

Ongoing cultural organizations also helped to break down emotional and real barriers. *The Cross Border Orchestra of Ireland*, established in 1995, brought together young people from different backgrounds and communities, through the medium of music. The northern band *Different Drums of Ireland* took the music of the sectarian communities and decided to marry them, with the lambeg drums and the bodhrans played side by side.

In 1998, the Belfast, or Good Friday, Agreement, was passed. It set out a complex series of provisions relating to a number of areas, including: the future status and system of government within Northern Ireland; the relationship between Northern Ireland and institutions in both the Republic of Ireland and the United Kingdom; human rights; the principle of respect for each of Northern Ireland's communities and their traditions; and the normalization of British security arrangements within Northern Ireland.

Slowly, the borders between the two entities have softened.

Milwaukee Irish Fest featured the Derry/Donnegal Showcase, highlighting the music, culture and arts of the two neighboring counties. The fact that this was a collaboration between counties in different countries was almost lost in the celebration. Aidan Cassidy, the Deputy Director of the Northern Ireland Bureau, felt that by hosting events such as this showcase, Milwaukee Irish Fest had helped the peace process in Northern Ireland.

This year, the 68th Annual Holiday Folk Fair will have a theme of "Celebrate Culture Without Borders." The European Union helped to break down the older borders of its member states. There is a trading of cultural institutions and traditions in the EU. It is best exemplified by the experiences of the Irish people.

We are again the face of the Irish community in this area. Each year we are called upon to represent the Irish, to show the world what we are, what we have done, and what we can do. To do that, the Shamrock Club will need volunteers for our retail, cultural, and food areas. We also need to sell tickets to the Folk Fair.

Admission is as follows: Adults \$10 at the door, \$8 in advance. Tickets will be available for sale at the November membership meeting. You can also use the accompanying order form to purchase tickets via mail. As a sponsoring group of the Fair we need to sell a number of tickets or make up the cost elsewhere. We will need help in a number of areas. We need volunteers for our sales, cultural and food areas. Please check our "Volunteers Needed" in *Reflections*.

You will receive the annual Folk Fair participant pin, plus admission for Folk Fair for all three days. Trinity Dance School be representing the Irish in dance. The Holiday Folk Fair will have a number of special events during the course of the weekend. They will include Dance Pavilion: a place to learn dances from around the world. Also: Food from around the world; unique gifts for you and someone special; international entertainment; cultural exhibits to assist you in learning about your heritage.

There will be an Interdenominational Religious Service on Sunday at 10 A.M. Holiday Folk Fair International is produced by the International Institute of Wisconsin. The International Institute is a not for profit organization dedicated to international cooperation. They try to develop a multiethnic, multi-cultural perspective, through education, exchange, communication, social activities, and immigration and naturalization services. Their website is [<http://www.folkfair.org>].

The borders are still a place of interesting happenings. During 2001, customs officers in Northern Ireland seized thousands of gallons of smuggled diesel, millions of smuggled cigarettes, bootleg liquor, fake CDs, DVDs, computer games and football team merchandise. And in 2011, the smuggling of cheaper diesel fuel into the South, due to the increase in the carbon tax on fuel, has led to the Republic increasing border inspections.

Some things will always be a part of the Irish nature, it seems, borders or not.

Report from the ICHC Fund Raising Committee

On September 6 the Committee met to finalize the report on the request from the ICHC for a contribution to the fund to do extensive remodeling, repair, and reconstruction to their existing building. The committee consisted of Maggie Blaha, Tim O'Brien, Ed and Betty Mikush, Tom and Gail McAleese, and Josh Walton. Also present was Karen Pendergast from the ICHC Board.

The Committee questioned Karen extensively on the progress of the fundraising, on the initial work, and on the long term goals for the building.

While much preliminary work has been done to secure sponsors, the feeling among the contacts is to wait for someone to step forward with a significant donation to show support in the Irish community. It was the Committee's initial thought that we would also wait for an indication of support from other groups, but considering the fact that the Shamrock Club is the most prominent Irish group, and the one most visible in the building, the Committee decided that it was our responsibility to take the first step.

The ICHC Board will concentrate on new accessible toilets, a remodeling of the lower level bar to be available for private business groups, and other features designed to make the building more desirable for renting, thus increasing the income. Some items may need to be handled sooner than planned due to building code requirements or emergency repairs.

The ICHC is starting a membership drive, with dues and donations, providing members with certain privileges.

The ICHC has no intention of abandoning this building and feels that they have a Board and staff dedicated to improving and maintaining the Irish Cultural and Heritage Center.

The possibility of Naming Rights in some form was discussed, but the Committee did not consider it worthwhile. The ICHC did not require an official written proposal, although the Board may feel that a signed document would be appropriate. We assume that this might lock us in to the second year.

The ICHC Fund Raising Committee recommends that the Shamrock Club of Wisconsin pledge to the ICHC the sum of \$10,000 for each of the next two years. At the end of the fiscal year 2012-2013, a Committee be appointed to review the progress of the renovation and the status of the Club finances, and consider a further donation.
