Glasnevin Cemetery

Ireland's largest cemetery, Glasnevin Cemetery in Dublin, is the final resting place for more than 1.5 million people. Created by Daniel O'Connell in 1832 as a cemetery where all people, regardless of religion, could be buried, it quickly became the main Catholic Cemetery in Ireland. Prior to its creation, there were no Catholic graveyards in Dublin. This was the result of the evil Penal Laws, which restricted the civil and religious rights of Catholics.

In 1831, the original acreage was consecrated by Monsignor Yore and five months later Michael Carey of Dublin became the first person interred there. In the time before the creation of Glasnevin, Catholics were buried in Protestant cemeteries with limited funeral services.

The cemetery was originally named Prospect Cemetery and covered nine acres. Today, renamed Glasnevin, the cemetery covers over 120 acres.

Who is buried there? Well, there is not enough space here to list the more than 1.5 million names, but numbered among them are himself, the great Daniel O'Connell, Charles Steward Parnell, Brendan Behan, Maude Gonne, Michael Collins, Éamon de Valera, many of Ireland's revolutionary heroes, and perhaps an ancestor or two of some of Wisconsin's own Irish.



A specially built Round Tower in the ancient style stands over the grave of the great liberator Daniel O'Connell (all but his heart which at his request is buried at Irish College in Rome) and his family. It was constructed in 1860 and at 171 feet is the tallest Round Towel of that style in Ireland.

Students of history and architecture and Ireland, and that includes most if not all of us, will find the changing style of death monuments/tomb stones in the cemetery fascinating. There are simple high and low stone monuments, large and small walled crypts, modest and elaborate Celtic crosses, and simple and elaborate Italian marble monuments of more recent years. Because of the cemetery's age, there is rubble, desolation and abandonment of crumbling and broken monuments. Some restoration of grave sites is being done, but this is a large and time-consuming activity.

The high walls with watch towers surrounding the cemetery were built to deter body snatchers in 19th century Dublin. The Royal Academy of Surgeons and schools of anatomy required bodies for research to improve their scientific knowledge, and vast numbers of bodies were needed for this research. Until passage of the Anatomy Act in 1832, bodies for research were limited to executed criminals. Thus the business of robbing cemeteries for recent burials sprang up. As well as high walls constructed to keep the Resurrectionists (the name given grave robbers) out, straw was often added to the soil to make digging difficult, heavy stone slabs were laid on graves, and guard dogs roamed the cemeteries to keep graves intact. Additional walls were built as the cemetery expanded over the years.

Guided tours of Glasnevin Cemetery are available for a small fee, but you can also purchase a heritage cemetery map and guide yourself around the cemetery at your leisure.

Hallamor Concert Liz Carroll And Cormac McCarthy February 11, 2012

The ICHC is proud to welcome Liz Carroll back to the Hallamór. This Chicago native astounded the Irish music world when she won the Senior All-Ireland Championship at age 18 and she has been amazing audiences across the globe ever since touring as a solo artist and with top bands including *Green Fields of America*. Liz has received numerous accolades including a 2010 Grammy Award nomination, along with guitarist John Doyle, for their album *Double Play*. In April, Liz was awarded the Cumadóir TG4 and became the first American-born composer to receive the traditional music prize from Ireland's Irish music television station.

Accompanying Liz is Cork-born composer and pianist Cormac McCarthy who began studying both traditional and classical music at an early age. He has earned degrees in piano performance and composition and is a graduate student in jazz studies at DePaul University in Chicago.

Irish Band Bua In ICHC Parlour Saturday, Feb. 4

Four of America's most talented young traditional Irish musicians will perform in the warm and intimate Parlour of the Irish Cultural and Heritage Center, 2133 W. Wisconsin Ave., Milwaukee, at 7:30 p.m. on Saturday, Feb. 4.

Based in Chicago and taking their name from the Irish word for victory, their music is strongly influenced by the *Bothy Band* and *Planxty*, both seminal Irish groups of the 1970s. They have performed at many of the most prestigious Irish festivals in North America including Milwaukee Irish Fest, Boston's Irish

Connections Festival, the Dublin Irish Festival, and the Goderich Celtic Roots Festival, among many others. Individually, they have shared the stage with a who's who of the top Irish musicians.

Brian Ó hAirt's evocative singing, often in Irish Gaelic, is central to *Bua's* unique sound. He plays concertina and also adds *sean-nós* dance to performances. Sean Gavin is *Bua's* instrumental "heart" with an ornate, driving style on flute and uilleann pipes while Devin Shepherd is known for a sophisticated and exciting fiddle style. Guitarist Brian Miller provides instrumentals on guitar and Greek bouzouki as well as backing vocals.

David Francey At Irish Fest Center February 11

Canadian singer-songwriter David Francey will deliver the news in an eloquent, engaging, witty, no frills, and sometimes provocative format when he showcases his ninth album, *Late Edition*, during a concert at the Irish Fest Center, 1532 Wauwatosa Ave., at 7:30 p.m. on Saturday, Feb. 11.

Recorded live in Nashville, Tenn., and produced by music legend Kieran Kane (who also provides back-up vocals and instrumentals), the 12 original songs exemplify Francey's pared down yet beautiful words and down-to-earth style. The collection includes deeply personal "news" such as the sweet ballad "Grateful," which is dedicated to his wife.

The album's title is also a nod to Francey's days as a newspaper delivery boy in Ayershire, Scotland, before he emigrated to Canada with his parents when he was 12. After winning his first JUNO (the Canadian equivalent of a Grammy) in 2002, Francey left a 20-year career swinging a hammer as a carpenter on construction sites to concentrate on being a performing artist.

Along with a third JUNO in 2008, Francey has won numerous prestigious awards including the 2010 John Lennon Songwriting

Contest.
